His-story


When I bought my first BMW, I thought it would be my last BMW. Now here I find myself on number three, and looking back on what seems like so many years, and at the same time no time at all.

I bought my first bike to ride cross country. It was a '78 Honda CB750F, which had not been well maintained. I ended up learning to ride on that bike, a much better use for it than riding for days on end. As I look back on it, it was a beater, and the fact that I didn't know anything about riding or fixing didn't help matters. The chain had worn a groove in the center stand (I didn't do that), fuses routinely blew, it steered like a bathtub, and I loved it to death. Never rode it any great distances, but had a great time wherever I took it – as long as it kept running.

Then I met the K75T. It was the only motorcycle that passed my girlfriend's "rear end" approval process. Not to mention, power, handling, stability, good looks, competence, quality... well, I don't have to tell you. And that was the bike I took cross country, from New York to Montana, New York to North Carolina, New York to Mew Mexico! Glorious 700 mile days at 90mph, daily commuting into Manhattan, weekend forays into what pass as mountains back east, and never a stumble from that bike. The Honda had been a crush; I developed a deep relationship with the K75. So much so that when it was totalled in a Manhattan crash, it was less than two weeks later that I bought a white K75S.

That bike was the same, but even more. Two weeks after I picked it up I spent a month severely overloading it on a 6,000 mile trip to Utah and back. Soon after that I moved to New Mexico, and the bike made several more trips to Montana, Colorado, Arizona – just as rock solid as the T had been. I never even had a car until about two years ago. That bike truly did it all.

And now here's the K12. We're still getting to know each other, though the furthest we've gone togeth-

er so far has been Red River. But the relationship is growing, and the big red bike is teaching me. It's more than the previous K's in every way. Maybe not as good for "doing everything," but an absolute blast, and most excellent for making me a better rider.

Remember that thrill you got throwing your leg over your first bike? It's kind of like that. It makes me smile to think about riding it. It makes me wonder where we'll go together.

The adventure will start at the Furr's Cafeteria parking lot on south Coors Blvd (about a block south of I-40, on the west side of Coors) that Saturday morning at 11:15am with departure at 11:30am. We will head south on Coors to Rio Bravo and turn west on the new West Rio Bravo extension (my choice for "Most Pointless New Highway Construction in New Mexico, 2002") which then does a right angle north on Paseo del Volcan all the way past the rather startling twisties by the Double Eagle Airport.

We will then start zigzagging our way north and east through a lot of new housing projects until we set down on Unser Boulevard. From there it's a straight shot north along the ridge west of Albuquerque and Rio Rancho until we reach highway 550, then east to downtown Bernalillo for a late (about 12:30-1:00) lunch at The Range.

From there, you're on your own to return home and don't be surprised if you've put about a hundred miles on the odometer during this urban tour!




